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## **CHAIR'S AGM REPORT**

Northamptonshire Heritage Forum has enjoyed another successful year. The celebrations of the Forum's 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary in 2022 have been built upon. The Forum's profile amongst the heritage community in the county continues to grow, attracting new members and through working collaboratively with key stakeholders.

The Heritage Forum is a valuable point of contact for its membership, who have given their time and commitment to support a stronger, more resilient and sustainable heritage sector. They have continued to share best practice and provide practical assistance to other members.

West and North Northamptonshire Councils have been active in promoting heritage activity and during the past year have co-ordinated the development of the county's tourism strategy, which was launched on Tuesday 19 March 2024 at Northampton Museum and Art Gallery. The Heritage Forum has been active in the consultation process and welcomes the new initiatives which will flow from the strategy.

Forum members have demonstrated that they want heritage venues to play a major role in attracting visitors and have shown themselves willing to participate in the new visitor economy strategy. A new Local Visitor Economy Partnership will be established this year, which will provide opportunities for coordination in promoting heritage in the county. The Heritage Forum will benefit through engagement as the partnership develops.

Members have been active in supporting the Discover Northamptonshire Hub at Rushden Lakes through display and participation. More than 10,000 residents and visitors have already have already explored the opportunities it provides. The hub promotes tourism, encourages employment, volunteering and skills development. It also supports local businesses and community engagement.

The Heritage Forum engaged with North Northamptonshire Council in the development of their culture, tourism and heritage business plan for 2024/2025, which provides clarity on delivery and supports partnership working.

The members' booklets have been a very successful tool for forum members. At this AGM the latest edition is launched. 25,000 copies of the previous edition were distributed throughout the county and were very well received. We are confident that the current edition will play a useful role in attracting visitors from within the county and beyond.

Today also sees the latest publication of the Heritage Forum's journal, Hindsight. This excellent edition will the last one edited by Enid Jarvis. The Forum is hugely grateful to Enid and her editorial team and thanks her for her outstanding contribution to the Forum's success. Popular demand has seen an increased number of the journal being printed, made possible through the Hindsight Fund. The Heritage Forum is active in promoting members' venues and activities through our website, newsletter and Facebook page. The website has increased its visitor numbers and the content continues to grow. Our website manager, Lynne Dickens, oversees the development of the website and ensures it is up to date. Thank you Lynne for ensuring this valuable asset is relevant to the needs of members.

The newsletter is a core means of communication for members and is also read by our website visitors. The newsletter demonstrates the wide range of heritage activities being undertaken by our members. This is much appreciated and your contributions are highly valued. The newsletter is distributed electronically throughout the Midlands and the East of England.

Janet Lawrence passed the co-ordination of the newsletter to Shanna Wells and then to Colin Ashworth during the past year. Members recognise the importance of the newsletter and the considerable work involved in bringing the newsletter together. Many thanks to Janet, Shanna and Colin.

The Heritage Forum is active in promoting equality, diversity and inclusion and has continued to work with faith communities throughout the county, helping them to share their community heritage through the newsletter.

Delapré Abbey hosted the Heritage Forum's evening dinner and lecture on 14 June 2023. It was a splendid summer evening in a beautiful setting and was well attended. The lecture given by Graham Evans, the Chairman of the Northamptonshire Battlefields Society, outlined battles in the county throughout the ages.

Graham also explained how the Battlefields Society had built a mutually beneficial partnership with Delapré Abbey Preservation Trust. Through collaboration new information boards had been placed on the site of the Battle of Northampton, 1460. I was pleased to represent the Heritage Forum at the unveiling of the information boards.

Joint marketing is enabling more visitors to access the Abbey to attend events and exhibitions. The Battlefields Society have their meetings in the Abbey.

On Friday 12 July I attended the official opening of the glass extension to 82 Derngate. The ribbon was cut by Darren Henley, Chief Executive of Arts Council England. It was an excellent occasion. I want to congratulate the trustees, staff, volunteers and Friends of 78 Derngate on the completion of this significant project. The extension provides vital additional space for visitors and its adjoining galleries.

I had the opportunity to discuss with Darren Henley the Northamptonshire National Portfolio Organisations and update him on Heritage Forum developments.

The 2023 Northamptonshire Heritage Forum's Awards ceremony was held on Wednesday 12 July. The evening was hosted by Chester House Estate in the beautifully restored threshing barn. It was a glittering evening enjoyed by all present.

It was good that our supporters and partners played an important part in celebrating the wonderful work of Forum members. Cllr Helen Howell, Deputy Leader of North Northamptonshire Council and Executive

Lead for Sport, Leisure, Culture and Tourism welcomed Forum members and our distinguished guests. These included our Patron, Lord Spencer; Charlotte Brudenell DL, deputising for the Lord Lieutenant; Rachel Mallows MBE DL, Chair of Northamptonshire Surprise and the Chairs and Leaders of the unitary authorities. Our guests presented our awards.

John Griff DL guided our speakers through the ceremony without any hitches and on time. He made our evening so special.

Wicksteed Park won the heritage organisation of the year award, presented by Lord Spencer. All the winners and the entries impressed the judges for their high standard of delivery.

Charlotte Brudenell and Lord Spencer emphasised the importance of promoting the heritage of the county and the value of the Heritage Forum.

A huge vote of thanks is due to Laura Malpas who organised the awards and all those who worked so hard to make it such a splendid occasion. Many thanks are due to Jack Pishhorn, whose team presented the venue so well.

Members of the Forum participated in partners' events, the Heritage Fair at Abington Park Museum and the Nene Valley Festival in September. In addition members welcomed visitors for Heritage Open Days. These events provide opportunities to attract new visitors and are extremely important for the visitor economy of the county.

A survey of heritage organisations has led to the planning of a further Heritage Fair at Wicksteed Park in April 2024.

The September Forum meeting at Delapré Abbey gave an opportunity for members to highlight their successes in 2023. Reports were provided by Delapré Abbey, Rockingham Forest Trust at Stanwick Lakes and Daventry Museum. They demonstrate examples of excellent practice in welcoming visitors and ongoing projects to excite and entertain.

Partnership between members and working together for mutual benefit was demonstrated vividly at the Heritage Forum's Annual History Day at Oundle on 28 October. It was a collaboration between Oundle School Archives, Oundle Historical Society and Oundle Museum, who provided excellent talks and tours. The event was sold out as 90 members enjoyed the facilities of Oundle School. The event was a great success. Many thanks are due to John-Paul Carr who organised the day on behalf of the Forum.

On Tuesday 30 January 2024 Heritage Forum members were entertained and enjoyed lunch at Sulgrave Manor. Following the Forum meeting members enjoyed a talk on the history of Sulgrave Manor and the Washington family, followed by a tour of the house and garden. Members were able to wander round the building exploring each room with questions answered by the staff. Many thanks to the Sulgrave Manor team and Laura Malpas who organised the day.

Jack Pishhorn, Head of Culture, Tourism and Heritage for North Northamptonshire Council brought members up to date with the Council's Business Plan in his areas of responsibility. This was helpful in informing the Forum of how they can participate in the Council's work and help the community to maximise the outcomes.

From April 2024 Museums Development Midlands will be working as one team across the Midlands region. This partnership will be managed by Ironbridge Gorge Museum Trust and Leicestershire County Council. Their support for the Midlands' Museums responds to the Art Council England's strategy 'Let's Create'.

At the September Forum meeting I indicated that I would be standing down as Chair in April 2024. The committee established a recruitment committee and has undertaken a selection process to find a new Chair. The committee was led by Laura Malpas and I am grateful to all those who have taken part. This activity was discussed again at the January 2024 Forum meeting.

It has been a huge privilege to be Chair of the Northamptonshire Heritage Forum between 2020 and 2024. I have been excellently supported throughout by the hard work and friendship of Laura Malpas (Vice-Chair), Angela Scheidegger (Hon. Secretary), Jon-Paul Carr (Hon. Treasurer and Membership Secretary), Jane Baile, Katie Boyce, Kate Chadwick, Richard Clinton, Debra Cox, Lynne Dickens, Sylvia Hughes, Belinda Humfrey, Charles Lister, Andrea Pettingale and Jack Pishhorn. The committee has outstanding skills and experience, which are of great value to the Heritage Forum.

I would like to thank all those members who have attended Forum events or written in the newsletter or Hindsight and advertised their events on the Forum Facebook page.

I want to thank all the members of the Heritage Forum who have made my time as Chair such a rewarding and enjoyable experience. At a time with rapidly changing challenges and agendas, Forum members have shown themselves to be successful in promoting and explaining the unique heritage of the county. Their ingenuity, innovation and willingness to work together in new ways will ensure an exciting future for the heritage community and visitor economy in Northamptonshire.



## FRIENDS OF THE ALFRED EAST GALLERY AND MANOR HOUSE MUSEUM

The gallery remains closed, but there is light at the end of the tunnel! North Northants Council has approved the financing of the scheme to refurbish the roof over the library and gallery. Work has already begun with the clearing of the colourful Virginia creeper from the outside walls. It has brought about groans from some quarters, but the growth was at least in part, responsible for the damage and water ingress. The path is now clear for the roof to be tackled.

In the meantime, there has been some activity by the Kettering gallery staff taking place in our town centre contemporary art space ARTworks. It bodes well for future cooperation between the two galleries. ARTworks remains as popular as ever with established artists hanging their work, workshops for adults and children, and displays of craft work. It has also become a popular spot for artists to hang out.

The Friends have continued to be active, with regular meetings and outings, town and cemetery walks. A set of three monographs on the cemetery: Notable Graves, Exotic Trees and Monumental Masonry are now available, as well as three illustrated guides to the town's more interesting buildings.

The future of the Museum is still uncertain, although we have repeated assurances that a solution to the problem will be found in the near future.

## **ROADE LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY**

#### RAF to Formula One: Wednesday, 21 February 2024

A great talk by Gerald Lovell about the history of Silverstone. In 1136 there was an order of Benedictine

monks called Luffield Priory which continued until Henry VIII disbanded them. There was also a royal hunting lodge used right through from Henry I to Edward II – the land was sold to a commoner called Sir Richard Lovell. Silverstone was surrounded by forests and, back in the day, it had 24 woodyards. The sole remaining woodyard today is Linnells. During WW2 an aerodrome was built on the land, and a Wellington Bomber training station with three runways, 200 staff and 130 German POWs. Pilots had a 10-week course and, from 1943 to 1946 there were 126 courses for pilots, navigators and gunners. Sadly, in the first 12 months ,there were 36 crashes and 124 deaths – 8 in one

crash. The layout of the airfield became the basis of the Silverstone race circuit. The inaugural RAC Grand Prix was held in 1948. The first Formula One Grand Prix was held on13 May 1950, the winner was Guiseppe "Nino" Farina in an Alpha Romeo, and since then Britain has had 10 World Champions. The benefits for the village have been tremendous, and now the Silverstone Museum has opened holding a vast number of historic mementos.

Richard Dunkley (Builder & Railway Contractor): Wednesday, 27 March 2024

We had a very interesting talk by Dick Hennessey and Hilary Spurrier (pictured), from Blisworth Heritage Society, who brought to life local man Richard Dunkley whose ancestors were noted in 1678 as carpenters and builders.

Richard started from nothing to become a builder of railways, bridges, stately homes - such as East Carlton Hall and Collingtree Grange - and substantial houses such as his own, The Loundes. It is thought that his career started with work at Blisworth Church, where there is a carved shoe with the initials RD dated 1826.



As Richard's reputation grew, Blisworth developed from a rural village

to a hive of industry with a canal, stone quarries and the coming of the railways. All this gave Richard great opportunities and scope. It was also a period of change nationally – public health, education, and prison reform. Working with architect E. M. Law, Richard became the builder of choice for country houses, schools, a prison and many other buildings, often commuting to London by train. He also became a railway contractor and built Blisworth railway arch, locally known as "Dunkley Bridge" on the Northampton Road between Blisworth and Milton Malsor. He built Castle Station in Northampton, Roade Station, Blisworth Station and Blisworth Hotel (now the Walnut Tree) where people from London came for a day out to visit the pleasure gardens.

## NORTHAMPTONSHIRE ARCHIVES

Hello, my name is Graeme MacLeod. I joined the Northamptonshire Archives Service as a Collections Officer in December 2023. I am covering for Victoria Oakman who, as many of you will know, is on maternity leave. I have moved to Northampton from sunny Inverness, Scotland, where I was born and bred. Indeed, I graduated from the University of the Highlands and Islands with a degree in history and politics in 2017.

One of the first steps in my archival career was becoming an Archives Assistant at The Highland Archive Centre in Inverness. Although I had used archives for my undergraduate dissertation, I found working in an archive very different, but also very enjoyable. While we were in lockdown, my wife encouraged me to apply to the Archives and Records Management course at the University of Dundee and so in 2021, while things were still not quite normal, I embarked on the distance learning course. The course was extremely interesting and it was brilliant to meet (albeit digitally) others who were also studying from as far afield as America, Italy, Jersey and Glasgow! Undertaking the course while also working as an Archives Assistant could be challenging, but fortunately I had a lot of support. I received my PG Dip in Archives and Records Management in August 2023 and decided to apply for the Collections Officer post in Northamptonshire as it was something and somewhere completely different.

After Sarah, the Heritage Services Manager, kindly interviewed me via Microsoft Teams (as it is roughly 500 miles from Inverness to Northampton, so a bit far, insert your own Proclaimers joke), and following an in-person visit in October to ensure I was who I said I was, and my wife and I moved in December.

I am thoroughly enjoying my time here at Northamptonshire Archives Service, as everyone has been very welcoming and happy to answer any queries I might have about archives or the local area. So far, I have been liaising with members of the public with a variety of archival accessions, getting to grips with diocesan records, and helping in the search room and on reception.

The main project on which I am working is to catalogue all of the Rate Books which we hold in the archives. This has been generously part-funded by Northamptonshire Family History Society with the aim of making them more accessible to the public.

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The first task was to locate every rate book that the service holds and this meant checking literally each shelf in the three repositories to note the presence of any rate books and which parish/district they were from. It was something of a mammoth task as there are hundreds of them and they are not all in one place. Having located them all (I think), I have set to work on cataloguing them, beginning with those for Brackley as they were the smallest grouping.

I have managed to collate all 96 volumes for Brackley and gather them all in one place, which was not easy given that they are of various shapes and sizes. A catalogue is being created, noting the type of rate, the year and which body levied the rate (the urban district council, borough and rural district council are involved). We are also deciding where in the repositories the rate books will be located in the future. The system I am using is working well for my 'pilot set', so I shall be using the same approach for all the rate books held at Northamptonshire Archives.

I was also keeping a record of any that could not be handled because of their condition. These books cover a large timespan, from the mid-nineteenth century to the 1970s, and cover various rates including poor, general, special and water rates. Some were found which required conservation but the majority of those have already been treated and there are only a few shelves yet to be investigated.

The project, although challenging, is very interesting, and understanding the different legislation influencing the content of the archives, as well as the differences between Scottish and English records, has been something which I feel I have just about got my head around.

## NORTHAMPTONSHIRE RECORD SOCIETY

The Northamptonshire Record Society, based at the Northamptonshire Records Office, Wootton Park, have appointed Dr Graham Lampard as their General Secretary.

Graham hails originally from Oxford. He came to Northampton in 1983 to study leather technology at what was then the National Leathersellers Centre, at Nene College's Park Campus. He ended up being at Nene College until 2001, doing various courses including a higher national diploma in Chemistry and a degree in Chemical Science, via day release while working for the British Leather Confederation at Moulton Park and he subsequently worked for Leather International magazine. He also completed a doctorate in leather science from the University of Leicester. Subsequently, he worked as a journalist in the pharmaceutical industry before buying Craftsman Binders, a small bookbinding business that was in Ashburnham Road. The previous owner worked at Birdsall & Sons, which some will remember as the eminent bookbinders in the centre of Northampton until the early 1960s. This led to an interest in the history of bookbinding and Birdsall's in particular.

For several years Graham has served as a Clerk to Governors at several schools in the county and further afield, and in recent years has been an assistant curator at the now defunct Museum of Leathercraft in Northampton's Grosvenor Centre.

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### **OUNDLE HISTORICAL SOCIETY**



The Oundle Historical Society (OHS) has a varied programme scheduled for 2024/2025 covering a wide range of topics and periods of historical significance in the Oundle area.

The first fixture on Friday, 12 April, will be an entertaining talk by Stuart Orme (Curator of the Cromwell Museum in Huntingdon) on 'Henry VIII's Grandma'. This intriguing title refers to Margaret Beaufort's leading role in the foundation of the Tudor dynasty in the late fifteenth century and her philanthropic contribution to education. Even though this Newsletter will be published after the talk has taken place, we are including it in order to demonstrate the depth and breadth of our programme.

Janice Morris will deliver a talk on 10 May with another evocative title 'Saints & Sinners' to depict the wall paintings that can be found in churches around Oundle.

The September lecture will be given by Crispin Powell, who will draw on his access as archivist of the Buccleuch family collections to highlight the careers of black servants at Boughton during the 18th Century.

Sheila Harris will give a talk on 11 October about 'Oundle's Charities' and, on 8 November, Max Schurer will talk about his involvement in the discovery of Richard III's remains at Leicester.

At the beginning of 2025, OHS Members will await with interest the third instalment of Colin Pendrill's 'Mastering Laxton Free Grammar School' on 10 January, which will cover the history of Oundle School from 1922 to 2015.

On 14 February, Charlotte Young, from the Department for Continuing Education at Oxford, will provide scholarly insight into 'Royalist Estates in Northamptonshire during the English Civil Wars', when the Oundle area was characterised by families divided by the conflict.

In addition to the enlarged programme of lectures, visits will be made to Brigstock on 12 June (2024) in order to appreciate its rich history, and to Longthorpe Tower on 10 July in order to assess its important historical and artistic legacy.

Finally, Peterborough Morris will provide entertainment at the OHS AGM on 14 March 2025.

## Fire Marks

Our current exhibition "Look What We Found!" opened on 2 March and we were delighted to receive a visit from Phil and Janice Morris of the Fire Mark Circle. They had found a mention of one in our report to the last Forum meeting and came along to check it out. Apparently, some fire marks on display in museums much larger than ours are fakes, so we were relieved to have ours confirmed as authentic.

We have three fire marks in our collection, all of which are on display until 29 June. Thanks to Phil and Janice, we have been able to date them with more accuracy and see what they would have looked like when painted.

What are fire marks? The early 18th century saw the emergence of insurance companies so people could take out insurance against fire. As these companies grew, some started their own fire brigades to help fight fires at properties insured with them. It is believed that the Sun Fire Insurance Company (est. 1710) was one of the companies that operated in this area, and that they may possibly have had a fire brigade of some description which would fight fires at the properties of people insured with them. We have two Sun Insurance fire marks. The Sun Fire Insurance Mark 7JJ784 (shown below) belonging to Joseph Sudborough, farmer, would once have been gilded.



Any properties insured with an insurance company would have had a plaque fitted to the building to show which insurance company they were with. In the event of a fire the insurance fire brigades would turn out, but they would only put out the fire if the property was insured by their company. It was not uncommon for more than one insurance brigade to attend and, on arrival, whichever brigade was not required were more likely to hinder the other crew rather than attempt to help to put out the fire! In later years this was stopped, and the insurance brigades worked together when fighting fires.

There are believed to be at least two properties in Burton Latimer, which still have these plaques on their walls: one in Kettering Road and one in Church Street.

The Fire Mark from the Royal Exchange Insurance Company (on the next page) would have been brightly painted. This came from the wall of a building on the High Causeway, most likely the building that was once The Bell public house, which was demolished in the late 1960s to make way for the Library and Civic Centre. The one we have on display is one of the last to be produced in lead and dates from 1810-1838, so is possibly unlikely to have been purchased by The Bell, as the pub closed in 1810.

## NORTHAMPTON MUSEUM AND ART GALLERY

#### Stories from the collection - Robert Ball

One of the joys of working in a museum is finding the stories behind the objects given to the museum. One donation given to Northampton Museum and Art Gallery in the last few years was a group of photographs which reveal the far from ordinary life of Northampton resident, Robert Ball.

Robert was born on 21 August 1901, not far from the Racecourse in Northampton, to William and Lucy Ball. Robert's father was 37 and working as a machine operator in the Boot trade. Robert was christened on 3 November at St Lawrence's Church. It appears Robert displayed an aptitude for the piano at an early age, judging by this photograph of him standing proudly by a piano. This photograph was sent as a postcard to a relative in Northampton. The next photo might have been taken for display at one of the cinemas in Northampton where Robert is said to have accompanied silent movies. In 1928 Robert married Annie Priscilla Hardwick, also from Northampton. Photographs in the collection show the happy couple in their wedding clothes.







According to the information given to the museum with the photographs, Robert was a self-taught engineer and worked at the new Northampton Technical College (also known as St George's). The college had been established on Abington Street in 1924 before a site in St Georges Avenue was purchased and



formally opened by the Duke and Duchess of York in 1932.

Robert was also a keen photographer and took many local views including the floods of 1929 and the local carnival processions. He was also employed as a photographer for Mulliner's coachbuilding work at Bridge St, Northampton. Mulliner's was founded in 1760

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making mail coaches. Business boomed during the 1920s with orders for bodies on Armstrong, Siddeley and Vauxhall cars being exhibited at the 1920 London Motor Show, together with coachwork for Rolls-Royce and Bentley. Robert took images of some of the vehicles produced by Mulliner's including this ambulance (right) for the St John's Ambulance in Northampton.

Arthur Mulliner had married the eldest daughter of the founder of Northampton's Albion Steam Brewery in 1887, which may account for Robert's photographs recording the delivery of new brewing tanks arriving by train.

By the outbreak of World War II Robert and his wife were living in Ruskin Road, Northampton. During the war Robert's work at the Northampton Technical College included training fitters for the armed services. His prominent position in this photograph taken outside the college and dated 1941 shows Robert with some of his trainees.







Sadly, in the 1950s Robert lost both his parents and wife but Robert lived in Kingsthorpe until 1993. The technical college where he worked for so long eventually became part of the University of Northampton. It is hoped that in the future the University Archives may uncover more about Robert's work and the role of the Technical College during the WWII.

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## MADE WITH MANY

#### Wellingborough Stories book published

What is a story? A published definition says, "It is a narrative, either true or fictitious, in prose or verse, designed to interest, amuse, or instruct the hearer or reader".

With this in mind, Made With Many decided to tell real stories from communities in Wellingborough. Our aim was to collect and share stories from people who have lived or settled in Wellingborough since the mid-20th Century, reflecting the diverse heritage that is Wellingborough's community today.

With generous support from the National Lottery Heritage Fund, we created a programme of oral history interviews and artist commissions led by Wellingborough's communities. A series of community call-outs followed for individuals and organisations to register their interest in collecting stories from the people and groups who they felt had stories to share.

Stories were collected from people across Wellingborough's wide ranging communities, varying from vivid childhood memories of World War II to first impressions of arriving in the town. Next came call-outs for artistic commissions that would form the core of Wellingborough Stories Festival. Our community panel chose Kremena Dimitrova, Makers of Imaginary Worlds and Ruth Pigott as the commissioned artists for the festival.



The work that the artists co-created with the Wellingborough community groups culminated in the three week long Wellingborough Stories Festival. The Festival Hub was situated in the Swansgate Shopping Centre with fringe events in the Library, Victoria Centre, Castle Theatre and Kingsway Centre. Previous projects, the South Asian Heritage Project, *You Must Stay At Home* publication, the Windrush Generation quilt and *Wailingborough* podcasts (ghost stories) were also included.

Over 20,000 people engaged with the Festival participating in different heritage and creative activities, enjoying new public art, seeing films of Wellingborough's past and watching theatre performances about its future. You can still find some of Ruth's fantastic films on the Made With Many website and Kremena's beautiful murals continue to be displayed in the Swansgate Centre.

This publication captures the essence of the 18-month-long celebration of Wellingborough's varied and exciting untold stories, as well as the creativity and commitment of our town today.

## THE ROYAL ORDNANCE DEPOT VISITOR CENTRE

Planning for our D-Day 80 exhibition is nearing <u>H-Hour</u>. (Click the link for an explanation - Editor).

Weedon Depot's role in supporting the Normandy Invasion was significant. Long before June 1944, with some other depots, it assembled 'Beach Maintenance Packs' to sustain the British and Canadian Armies from the beaches until the Mulberry Floating Harbours could be built, or a regular port captured.

The packs contained everything from rations, weapons and spares, tools, vehicle parts, tyres and even replacement uniforms and webbing. Thousands of tonnes of items, arriving by train and lorry, were sorted and packed and sent to the embarkation ports and temporary sites in the south of England.

Thousands of women also made up smaller boxes of rations in their own homes or in village halls across this part of Northamptonshire. Putting together the exhibition should inform visitors about another part of this amazing site's history and the people who served, worked inside or lived around its walls. It has also opened a new area of research and knowledge for us while encouraging leadership and team skills that 'Ike' himself would recognise. The D-Day 80 exhibition runs from May to October.

This is a copy of an old post card showing the Market or Butter Cross in Brixworth. It is on the site of an older cross, erected in the 13th century to celebrate the granting of a charter by Henry III for the village to hold a weekly market and an annual fair. Behind the cross is the Heritage Centre which was originally called the Thomas Roe building, having been built in 1811 by his charity trustees and was the first school in the village.

Our meetings are held in the Village Hall in Holcot Road on the third Thursday of the month and begin at 7.30pm.



## WICKSTEED PARK

On March 24 Wicksteed Park celebrated the unveiling of a new piece of playground equipment that was designed by an 11-year-old Northampton local named Mia and built by Wicksteed Leisure. Inspired by her favourite fairy tale, *The Beanstalk* is a yellow-andgreen-themed climbing frame with a tube slide. Mia's design won out over 50 entries in a competition that encouraged children to design a piece of play equipment they would like to see in the playground. The opening of this play equipment that was attended by the Kettering Mayor Emily Fedorowycz and Philip Hollobone MP, marked the closing of a £2m National Lottery Heritage Fund project called @Play.



National Lottery funding has also helped to fund the restoration of the Garden Room tearoom, which offers stunning views across the park from the top of its famous Edwardian-style Pavilion. Seven traditional telescopes have also been installed, pointing at key areas of the 147-acre park. When visitors look through the viewer, they see an image of what that area looked like in years past and hear commentaries by actors playing the voice of Charles and Hilda Wicksteed explaining the history of the features.

#### **Future Events**

On April 28 we will be hosting the Heritage Fair, sponsored by Discover Northamptonshire in partnership



with Northamptonshire Family History Society (see larger flyer elsewhere in this newsletter). It will be open to public from 11am to 4pm with a large variety of stalls showcasing Northamptonshire's history and heritage. Entry to the Heritage Fair is free but normal parking charges will apply.

## NORTHAMPTON TOWN COUNCIL

#### Ancient 'Oak Apple Day' ceremony to take place in Northampton



An ancient ceremony of thanksgiving will take place at All Saints' Church on Monday, 27 May to commemorate Northampton's Oak Apple Day.

This annual ceremony, organised by Northampton Town Council and the Lord Lieutenancy is unique to Northampton and remembers the generosity of King Charles II, who donated over 1,000 tons of timber to reconstruct All Saints' Church and halved the town's taxes for seven years following the 1675 Great Fire of Northampton.

The public ceremony will begin at 11:30am, when a Civic Procession enters All Saints' Church for a thanks giving service led by Father Oliver Coss. Then at midday, the A Company LNR Corps of Drums will parade to All Saints' Church via George Row.

The highlight of this traditional ceremony comes just after midday, when the Mayor places a wreath of oak leaves on the statue of Charles II, standing high on the church's portico. A salute to the Lord Lieutenant and the High Sheriff is given from this lofty position, followed by a prayer of thanksgiving, the playing of the National Anthem, a toast to the Mayor and a final blessing.

The unusual name of the ceremony is derived from the restoration of the monarchy, when Charles II came to the throne on 29 May 1660. The future King famously hid in an Oak tree, when he sought refuge from his roundhead enemies, following the 1651 battle of Worcester.

James Compton the then Earl of Northampton, spoke to Charles II and the bill to rebuild Northampton was passed, with Crown Commissioners sent to oversee the works and ensure that the benefactor of a new Northampton was never forgotten.



Once the new century had begun, the portico at All Saints' was completed, and the Mayor John Agutter sought public subscription for the statue of King Charles II, which was wreathed on Oak Apple Day.

## **KETTERING CIVIC SOCIETY**


After 23 years as Chairman, architect Paul Ansell has retired. Paul was highly respected by all and his

#### Visitors potty about pottery as Higham Ferrers wraps up display

Inspired by a clay centrepiece on display at the Northamptonshire Tourism Visitor Hub at Rushden Lakes, Higham Ferrers organisers decided to hold a weekend craft workshop. Visitors – young and old – were thrilled at the amulets, friendship bracelets and various ornaments that they turned out. Three-year-old Rhys Bremner, who was visiting with his grandmother Gill Bremner, rolled out the wet clay then took his dinosaur-shaped souvenir home to paint.

Higham Ferrers Tourism and HiFARS (Higham Ferrers Archaeological and Research Society) volunteers were on hand at the Heritage Crafts Family Workshop to show

visitors how to work with clay and wool and fashion jewellery and ornaments - and even little dinosaurs which they were able to take home to paint once the clay had dried.

The workshop marked the end of the four-month display by Higham Ferrers Tourism, HiFars and the Higham Ferrers Town Council.

The clay centrepiece on display at the Northamptonshire Tourism Visitor Hub was a commissioned replica Samian-ware bowl, based on original pottery sherds uncovered at the Roman excavation site in Kings Meadow, Higham Ferrers.

Rachel Smyth, deputy chair of HiFARS was on duty with volunteers on the first day of the workshop and Olwen Mayers, the HiFARS chair, on the second.

Carol Fitzgerald (pictured right), who is on the Higham Ferrers Tourism Committee, tried her hand at making pottery jewellery and said she was looking forward to seeing what it turned out like once it was painted.


