CHESTER HOUSE ESTATE

Northamptonshire's largest heritage free family attraction opened its doors this autumn.

Perfectly located on the banks of the River Nene, the project, joint funded by North Northamptonshire Council and the National Lottery Heritage Fund. Business Manager, Jack Pishhorn and his team took the lead with the project in early 2020 and have seen it through to completion on time and budget, introducing new and exciting

plans for the site, which itself can be dated back 10,000 years.

The 84-acre scheduled monument is built on a former Roman town and includes the Northamptonshire Archaeological Resource Centre (ARC), a learning centre, a free-to-enter museum, an artisan courtyard and farm shop and an events and wedding space, as well as the flagship farmhouse. The surrounding farmland has been cleared of scrub and a new mooring has been installed on the River Nene to allow access to those who arrive on foot and by water, as well as a new car park and footpath entrance in Claudius Way.



The restaurant serves local produce and catering

for events, as well as providing accommodation for wedding parties and tourists to the area. The site is open to the public with pre-booked car parking tickets from 10am every day.

LOCAL HISTORIAN, MIKE INGRAM

Northamptonshire Heritage Forum was saddened by the passing of Mike Ingram just before Christmas. It came as a great shock to his family, friends, colleagues and his many supporters.

Mike was a medieval historian and author. Many members of the Forum enjoyed his tours and talks. Mike was born in Northampton and was devoted to recording its history. He traced his family back, first to the owners of the Cross Keys Public House in Sheep Street at the beginning of the Nineteenth Century then further research led to discovery of a family member being a confectioner on the Market Square at the end of the Nineteenth Century.

His books included *Northampton Guildhall, A Beginner's Guide*, published in 2020. This was particularly significant as Mike was a Freeman of the Borough and loved the Guildhall. It was at the Guildhall that I had my last conversation with Mike. We had attended the Remembrance Sunday service at All Saints Parish Church on Sunday 14th November. Mike was extremely positive and was looking forward to his next publication, due in early 2022.

Also in 2020 Mike published Northampton, 5,000 Years of History, which was the result of a lifetime of research.

This significant publication for the county won the 'Hindsight Award for Best Published Work' in the Northamptonshire Heritage Forum Awards 2021. Mike was delighted to receive this award. Mike also published books about battlefields and was Chairman of the Northamptonshire Battlefields Society. His publications Richard III and the Battle of Bosworth, The 1460 Battle of Northampton and The Battles and Battlefields of Northamptonshire were all well received.

Mike had also been a trustee and a guide for the Naseby Battlefield Project.

The Northamptonshire Heritage Forum sends its condolences to Mike's family, friends and colleagues.



1921 CENSUS

Findmypast and The National Archives unveil the 1921 Census of England and Wales for the very first time

On 6 January 2021, Findmypast and The National Archives published the highly anticipated **1921 Census of England and Wales** online, as the 100-year rule, which ensures records are closed to the public for 100 years, has ended. After three years of intensive conservation and digitisation and with the help and support of the Office for National Statistics, the Census is now available to search and explore online, only at **Findmypast.co.uk**.

Taken on June 19th 1921 after being delayed by two months due to industrial unrest, the 1921 Census saw over 38,000 enumerators dispatched to every corner of England of Wales to capture the details of more than 38 million people. This included over 8.5 million households as well as all manner of public and private institutions ranging from prisons and military bases to public schools and workhouses.

Offering more detail than any previous census ever taken, the 1921 Census of England and Wales not only asked individuals about their age, birth place, occupation and residence (including the names of other household members and the number of rooms), but also their place of work, employer details, and gave 'divorced' as an option for marital status.

Now accessible to the public for the first time, these valuable documents provide visitors to Findmypast with millions of unique opportunities to uncover the lives of their ancestors, the history of their homes and communities, as well as providing a fascinating snapshot of life during an era that will resonate with many today.



Falling between the two world wars, the record paints a disparate picture of England and Wales, from the Royal household to the average working-class citizen, still reeling from the impact of WW1 a major housing crisis, the Spanish flu pandemic, ravaged economy and industrial turmoil.

The publication of these documents will mark the last significant census release for England and Wales in many people's lifetime as the 1931 Census was destroyed in a fire and the 1941 Census was never captured due to the Second World War. This means the next census will not be available until 2052.

From the famous to the infamous, the documents also provide a vivid snapshot of the lives of prominent individuals alive at that time, including cultural icons such as Lord of the Rings writer - J.R.R. Tolkien, Famous Five author - Enid Blyton, Peter Rabbit writer - Beatrix Potter, Winnie the Pooh author - A.A. Milne and the creator of

Sherlock Holmes, Arthur Conan Doyle. On the night the Census was taken Conan Doyle was playing host to a number of mystics and psychics, suggesting he may have been holding a seance at the time.

Due to the fact householders could now specify the names and addresses of their employer, and even the materials they worked with, this was the first Census to record many of the iconic brands which are now household names. This includes Boots, Cadbury's, Selfridge's, Schweppes, Sainsbury's, Rolls Royce, McVities and many more, revealing where and how the workers that helped build them lived.

NORTHAMPTONSHIRE ARCHAEOLOGICAL SOCIETY


NAS is about to publish the next edition of the county archaeological journal, *Northamptonshire Archaeology*, volume 41, 2021, which is a special edition focusing on *The Archaeology of Medieval Northampton*.

Given the central theme of this edition and its broader appeal, this volume will also be available to the general public.

Edited by Andy Chapman, the volume contains a series of articles that examine: the archaeology of the pre-Conquest town, including the Anglo-Saxon 'Palaces' east of St Peter's Church; Part 1 of an overview of the history and archaeology of Northampton Castle, with separate articles examining the pre-castle and castle archaeology uncovered in 2013 on the site of the new rail station; a major study of the location of the medieval Jewry and synagogue; shorter articles and notes on aspects of the archaeology of both the town and the broader county, along with book reviews and a roundup of archaeological work in the county 2018-20.

At 480 pages with numerous colour and black and white illustrations, it is on sale at £20.00, plus £4.00 p&p.

Why take part?

- You'll get free publicity on the National HOD website and through our promotional activity your events get extra press coverage
- It promotes and showcases our cultural heritage in the county
- It increases engagement with heritage

West Northamptonshire Council will deliver an extensive marketing campaign for this significant annual festival in the county.

There will be a physical brochure that will be distributed to heritage sites and other venues in the county, as well as digital marketing through, web and social media channels.

The timetable is as follows:

- 1 March registration for brochure/website entry opens
- 17 June registration for brochure entry closes
- 1 August brochure distribution

You don't need to be a big or fancy site; your event just needs to meet one of the four criteria below:

- Entrance to the event needs to be free so if you charge, for one day you could make entrance to your site free
- Offer something special or different give access to a part of your site that visitors don't usually get to see
- Provide some information set up a trail, devise a quiz, produce a booklet, or put on some skills demonstrations
- Run the event during the festival dates (9 to 18 September)






Roade war memorial. Its second outing was at The Deco Theatre in

CORBY POLE FAIR 2022

Corby Pole Fair has been awarded a grant from The National Lottery Heritage Fund to celebrate local history.

The Corby Pole Fair steering group has received a Heritage Fund grant of £158,000 to stage a major year-long community heritage celebration focused around the Corby Pole Fair on 3rd June 2022.

The Pole Fair is a major community celebration which takes place in the Old Village area of Corby every 20 years and is said to have been celebrated in some form for over a thousand years, with the next one planned to coincide with Queen Elizabeth II's Platinum Jubilee.

Thanks to money raised by National Lottery players, the volunteer steering group, alongside project partners **Made With Many**, will be able to continue this important tradition through a spectacular day celebrating local heritage. There are lots of historical stories associated with the Pole Fair, from its evolution as a small Viking settlement, to the right to hold fairs granted by Henry III in 1226, and the story of why Elizabeth I granted the Corby Charter after an accident in a bog. Next June's event aims to tell these stories through a variety of engaging activities, including a pageant, a living history encampment as well as Open Days at Corby Heritage Centre for

visitors to explore Pole Fair archives dating back to 1902.

Additional activities happening both before and after the main event are also part of the plan, which was created following a period of consultation during 2020, when the steering group surveyed and had conversations with local residents to find out what they wanted from the celebration. In the months running up to the fair there will be workshops with schools and community groups to learn about Corby's history, and the opportunity to create artwork to be showcased at the fair in June, including the making of large-scale puppets of significant figures which will lead a walking parade through the Old Village.

Local groups will also be invited to make decorative archways to adorn the three gateways to the Old Village, where the local Vicar will carry on the tradition of reading the Corby town charter at dawn on the day of the fair. Visitors to the fair will also be expected to pay a small toll to enter the fair on the day, or risk ending up in the village stocks!

The committee also have plans for a wide range of artistic and community activities, including music, street performers, a teddy bears' picnic and community breakfast, which need to be funding from other sources. So, to supplement the generous Lottery funding that has made the event possible, an additional crowdfunder and sponsorship opportunities for local businesses have been set up.

Following the 2022 Pole Fair in June, video footage of the event will be made into a film to capture this special day in Corby history, which will be shown through local and online screenings. Permanent heritage boards will also be



installed across the Old Village and a digital archive will be stored in the Corby Heritage Centre as a legacy for the enjoyment and education of generations to come.

This creative Regeneration Project is managed by the Churches Conservation Trust (CCT). It will restore the pub to dignity as a historic coaching inn. The two sites will be interconnected through the churchyard to give easy access. The Old Black Lion profits will support the maintenance of St Peter's. It will be a destination in its own right. Located at the heritage gateway of the town, close to the train station, it aims to increase the town's heritage offer, and give Northampton a mini heritage campus of excellent standard.


The book is published as a hardback by White Owl.

Caring Kindergartens and Daventry Museum become Pen Pals: Trunky the Elephant's Museum visit


